



Dear Town of Sanford:

As the new session of Congress began, I was honored to become the longest, currently serving member of the U.S. Senate to have never missed a roll call vote. As the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress ended, I cast my 4,563<sup>rd</sup> consecutive vote. It is a privilege to represent you in Washington, D.C. and I appreciate this opportunity to share some of my recent work as we look forward to the opportunities and challenges that lie ahead in the 112<sup>th</sup> Congress.

Creating jobs and strengthening our economy remain our nation's most pressing challenges. Far too many families and individuals throughout Maine and our nation are still suffering from a sluggish economy and high unemployment. That is why it was so vital for Congress to extend the 2001 and 2003 tax relief laws. I strongly supported a two-year extension because allowing these laws to expire would have resulted in one of the largest tax increases in our nation's history, and job killing tax hikes could well have plunged our economy deeper into recession.

Last year, I spoke to small business owners throughout Maine who told me that a tax increase could result in a loss of jobs and threaten the viability of their businesses. It is good news that Congress passed the two-year extension of these tax relief laws before 2010 came to a close, providing more certainty to businesses and relief for all taxpayers.

After years of repeated but unsuccessful attempts by the Maine delegation to address the federal truck weights law, I authored a successful truck weights pilot program in 2009 that was in effect for one year. The pilot program permitted trucks weighing up to 100,000 pounds to travel on Maine's federal interstates, where these trucks belong, rather than being diverted to secondary roads, through small communities, downtown areas, and school zones. The benefits have been evident: improved safety, lower costs, reduced energy use, and reduced emissions. I was disappointed that the U.S. House of Representatives failed to take action either to extend the pilot program or to make it permanent. Making the truck weights program permanent will be one of my top priorities this year and will be the first bill I introduce in the new Congress.

The President signed into law a number of bills that I authored or coauthored. I was proud to join Senator Joe Lieberman in leading the effort to repeal the so-called "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" law that applied to our armed forces. This long-overdue repeal enables the U.S. to join 35 of our closest allies in welcoming the military service of any qualified individual who is willing and capable of serving our country.

My efforts to counter the smuggling of illegal drugs across the Canadian border into Maine, and vice versa, were advanced when the President signed the "Northern Border Counternarcotics Strategy Act." I was the lead Republican sponsor of this law, which requires the Office of National Drug Control Policy to develop a counternarcotics strategy similar to that of the Southwestern border in collaboration with our Canadian partners. The Senate Homeland Security Committee also conducted an extensive investigation into the Fort Hood terrorist attack. We will soon release a report with recommendations on how to reduce the possibility of such an attack in the future.

Former Senator Evan Bayh and I authored a new law that establishes a new Advisory Council to develop a national plan for combating Alzheimer's disease. For the first time, this law charges federal agencies to develop a strategy to advance efforts to fight this devastating disease, at no additional cost to taxpayers. As far too many people know, Alzheimer's disease inflicts pain and hardship on families, and costs Medicare and Medicaid billions, yet our nation has been lacking a national strategy to focus on this disease.

Maine's natural resource industries are essential to our prosperity. Last October, along with other Delegation members, I testified at an International Trade Commission hearing that resulted in a ruling that Chinese and Indonesian paper companies had been engaging in illegal trade that is unfair to our domestic industry. During the debate on the Food Safety Modernization Act, I successfully advocated for an amendment, backed by Maine's small and organic farmers, to protect our small farms from excessive regulation.

In my ongoing efforts to save jobs in Maine, I succeeded in convincing the EPA to rework regulations known as "boiler MACT" in a manner that protects the environment and public health without jeopardizing jobs in the forest products industry. I also authored successful legislation to provide small contractors more time to comply with EPA lead-based paint regulations. The high fines for non-compliance would have put many small contractors in Maine out of business.

Working with the University of Maine, I helped advance the development of deep water, off-shore wind energy. Last summer, Energy Secretary Steven Chu visited UMaine at my request, which resulted in an announcement that the Department would dedicate \$20 million to develop and test deepwater offshore wind technologies. UMaine remains on the cutting edge of this work, which has the potential to create 15,000 jobs.

I secured funding for a number of important transportation projects in 2010. For example, following my request, U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood announced that the Department would award \$10.5 million for Maine's effort to save freight railroad service in Northern Maine, and \$20 million for the rehabilitation of the Memorial Bridge between Kittery and Portsmouth.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I worked to ensure that our men and women in uniform have the resources and support they need to protect our freedom. In 2010, I supported efforts to improve health care and other services for our military personnel and veterans, and authored key provisions to strengthen our national defense by supporting the vital work at Bath Iron Works, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Pratt & Whitney, the Maine Military Authority, and other Maine industries. Following my letter last year to the President's top budget official urging him to include increased funding for the DDG-51 program in next year's budget, Defense Secretary Gates recently announced that the Pentagon would seek an additional DDG-51 in its five-year budget.

The 112<sup>th</sup> Congress will bring extraordinary challenges as we work to improve the economy, lower the unemployment rate, seek ways to reduce federal spending to bring the federal debt under control, and debate a host of other important issues. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve Sanford and Maine in the United States Senate. A Message from Senator Jonathan Courtney

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

It is an honor to represent you in the Maine Senate, and I am grateful for the trust you have placed in me to work for the betterment of this community and our region.

This session I have been given the honor of serving as the Senate Majority Leader having been elected to this post by my Republican colleagues. This position brings new responsibilities which include helping to steer the direction of the Maine Senate and better position the state for economic success.

The State of Maine, like many of us, is experiencing tough economic times. Currently the state is facing an estimated \$800 million revenue shortfall for the next two-year budget. In order to bring the budget into balance, the Governor, along with the Legislature, must make some significant changes in the way state services are delivered and how taxpayer money is spent. I am confident that by reining in state spending, prioritizing our wants and needs and developing strategies for improving our business environment, we can put Maine back on track toward prosperity and create the opportunities that will keep our young people here in Maine.

I'm proud to live in a state where individuals work so hard to sustain their communities.

We hold town meetings where neighbors can find compromise amid their disagreements, while still being able to say hello the next morning at the corner store. We help our neighbors through tough times by sending care packages to overseas troops, donating to local food pantries, and raising money for sick members of the community. And we work with each other to make the most out of bad situations.

There's no doubt that times are still hard for Maine's working families, but I'm optimistic about the future because all this hard work is starting to pay off. This year, Mainers have been able to turn bad news into good for Maine's economy. In Brunswick, Kestrel Aviation announced that it would start making airplanes with composite materials on the site of the closing naval base. In Biddeford, small businesses are thriving in the space once occupied by the now closed North Dam Mill. In Port Clyde, fishermen are starting to create jobs after forming a co-op in the wake of declining prices.

What's more, Maine communities are doing what's needed to take full advantage of these and other opportunities.

We're strengthening the infrastructure on which we do business by protecting Memorial Bridge in Kittery, bringing the Downeaster to the Midcoast, and expanding broadband Internet.

Local groups and businesses are working with me to fight for regulations that recognize the successful conservation efforts of our fishermen, don't overburden our small family farms, and protect our paper companies from Chinese trade practices meant to undercut them.

We're educating workers for new jobs, like in Kennebec Valley to train solar technicians, at SMCC for composite materials, and the University of Maine for other green jobs.

And we're taking care of our people by making sure veterans get the benefits they've earned, families aren't bankrupted by illness, and seniors don't lose their hard-earned savings to the excesses of Wall Street.

## **Town Manager's Report**

As I write this report I am preparing the budget for the Town's 2011/12 fiscal year and it will once again include some downsizing in numbers of employees and services provided. It seems that every year putting together a budget becomes more difficult. On the positive side this challenge has made us more efficient although Sanford has always been a frugal Town. I do worry that in the long run that the cuts we are making will not be good for the future redevelopment of the Town particularly in regard to the continued deterioration of our streets and sidewalks.

Even with fewer resources the Town still had a good year. We tried a pay as you throw trash (PAYT) system that although repealed by the voters in November did result in some positive outcomes, the most significant of which was an increase in recycling volume from about ten tons per week before PAYT to about 30 tons today. Although this is down about ten tons per week since the repeal of PAYT it is still a great rate compared to last year. As a result of this success the Council plans to keep weekly recycling collection.

This year also saw the completion of the Mill Yard Road, (except for finish paving and a few street lights) and the demolition of the Aero Fab building. These improvements have opened up the former industrial heart of our community and laid the foundation for new development. In fact we have seen an increase in interest in these former mill buildings and currently have a development proposal before the Planning Board for Mill #4.

The Police Station was completed on June 14, 2010. Just last week I had the pleasure of showing representatives of the Town of Brunswick through the building. They were very impressed with the energy efficient design and the frugal but thoughtful approach we took to the design, layout and construction of this new facility. This truly is a facility that we can all be proud of and one that will serve the Town for many years to come.

In the fall of 2010 we received word that Sanford had been designated as the 911 center for York County. This means that all emergency calls made in York County will be received and dispatched from the Sanford facility. We currently serve as the public safety communication center for the County of York and for about a dozen other communities. We expect this business to continue to grow saving our neighbor's money and reducing our costs for this very important service

In December of 2010 long time Fire Chief Raymond Parent announced his retirement. Ray has served the Town for more than fourteen years after having served as Chief in Biddeford. I have to say that I have probably learned more from Ray than he has from me. He also worked with his assistant Jeff Rowe so that Jeff is fully prepared to become Sanford's next Fire Chief. Although I will miss Ray, Jeff is more than capable of stepping into his shoes.

In closing I would like to thank all the employees, elected officials and citizens who work to make Sanford such a great place!

## **SANFORD REGIONAL ECONOMIC GROWTH COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT**

The SREGC has completed its first year of operation. It had been a busy year as we developed the organization and staffing, developed a marketing /work plan and worked to with various business.

The Executive Director of the SREGC, Les Stevens, retired in 2010. We owe Les our thanks and a debt of gratitude for his leadership and contributions to Sanford. He set the Town on a course that will lead to economic growth.

The effects of the recession have been felt in Sanford, our State and across the Country. The SREGC remains optimistic about the long term economic health of Sanford. We developed a marketing plan that will reach out to companies and site selection consultants who are looking to establish, expand or re-locate. The goal of the marketing plan is to describe and promote the many assets that Sanford has to offer. The first and most essential component of this plan is a website that provides the information needed to evaluate Sanford as a place to locate a business and live. The website can be viewed as [www.sanfordgrowth.com](http://www.sanfordgrowth.com)

A recession of the magnitude that we have experienced over the last two years usually results in many changes within the economic structure of a community and Sanford is no exception. The recession took it toll on some of our community's businesses- big and small. We remain confident that the economy will slowly rebound and believe that Sanford is well positioned to take advantage of an improving economy.

The SREGC has worked with numerous businesses during the year as they evaluated options for their business. Maine Manufacturing is an example of a new company that has been able to grow during the recession and now has 100 employees working in their plant in the Industrial Park.

The SREGC provides economic development services to existing and new businesses. Some of the services include financial packaging, tax incentives, client casework and case management, intergovernmental relations and business advocacy. The Growth Council sponsored the forum, "Making Maine Work" and hosted each of the gubernatorial candidates to acquaint them with Sanford, our businesses, community issues and concerns.

We are expecting an even busier 2011 as we reach out to assist our local businesses and bring Sanford to the attention of new businesses searching for a home.

## **ASSESSOR'S OFFICE**

Property assessment administration is a complex and technical profession vital to the financial health of local government. The Sanford Assessor's Office is responsible for administering the ad valorem (according to value) tax system and its objective is to identify and appraise all property in Sanford and Springvale.

In Maine, the ad valorem tax is based on the principle that the amount of tax paid should depend on the fair market value of property owned on April 1<sup>st</sup> of the current tax year. The property taxes are a major source of revenue for financing local government services such as police, fire, schools, public works, parks and recreation, and town hall.

Assessed values used for tax purposes must be accurate so that the tax burden will be distributed fairly and equitably. The primary tasks performed by the Assessor's Office as we work toward completion of an assessment roll are:

1. Locate and identify all taxable property in Sanford and Springvale
2. Make an inventory of the quantity, quality and important characteristics of all taxable property
3. Estimate the value of each taxable property
4. Determine the extent of taxability of each property
5. Calculate the assessed value of each property
6. Prepare and certify the assessment roll of the entire jurisdiction
7. Calculation of tax rate and send tax bills

Our Town Meeting Members determine the amount to be spent to run our community. The assessed value is the base for calculating one's tax responsibility.

There are programs offered by the State Bureau of Taxation. For businesses with personal property, inquire about the "BETR Program". For the individual, inquire about the "Tax and Rent Reimbursement Program", filed annually with the State. Veterans, age 62 or 100% disabled are eligible for an exemption. File with Assessor before April 1<sup>st</sup> after your 62<sup>nd</sup> birthday. Maine residents are eligible for a "Homestead Exemption" on their home. A one time acceptable filing is required prior to April 1<sup>st</sup> of the tax year.

## DEPARTMENT of PLANNING & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The primary responsibility of the Department of Planning & Community Development is to provide technical support to the Planning Board, which is responsible for the development of the Town's Comprehensive Plan and recommending to council the various ordinances needed to implement the goals and objective of the Plan. The Planning Board also reviews all the private and public major land development applications and all subdivision applications. The Department has a staff of two: a Director, James Q. Gulnac, AICP and an Administrative Assistant, Barbara Bucklin.

The application review process can be as simple as an administrative review conducted by staff for minor changes to existing site plans; or it can involve the review and approval by the Site Plan Review Committee on those projects classified as minor; or a review by staff, SPRC, and Planning Board for all subdivisions and projects classified as major.

The Planning Board is responsible for establishing and updating the town's Comprehensive Plan. During the past year the staff and Board have reviewed a number of requests to clarify the definitions for some activities ranging from mineral extraction to antique businesses. This is in conjunction with the Board's review of the current outdated land use ordinances in the Town's Municipal Code. The Board has set a goal of completing the update during 2011.

In addition to his role as the Director of Planning, Mr. Gulnac serves as one of the town's three (3) Certified Community Development Administrators. In this capacity he assists in the administration of the State of Maine Community Development Block Grants (CDBG). These projects cover a wide variety of areas including public infrastructure projects, financial support for economic development projects that create jobs, and other community development activities relating to meeting the national objectives of eliminating slum and blight and providing assistance to those who are considered low and moderate income. He is also involved with other community development activities such as the Safe Schools Healthy Students project and Strategies for a Stronger Sanford as well as the Downtown Legacy. In this capacity he works closely with the Town grant writer.

Mr. Gulnac also serves as the town's Brownfields project coordinator. This highly successful program is funded through grants from the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The grant program consists of the assessment and cleanup of properties which, due to prior use, are no longer viable for development due to environmental conditions that can often be considered hazardous. The goal of this program is the ultimate redevelopment of the 'Mill complex'. The town has received numerous grants of over \$2 million dollars. This funding has been used to remove the hazardous materials in the Sanford Mill to prepare it to be transferred to a private developer for future use as mixed use. The Town also secured funding to remove the Aerofab mill and prepare the site for parking.



## CODE ENFORCEMENT

This department administers the Zoning Ordinance, the Shoreland Zoning Ordinance, building and other codes adopted by the town, and state statutes. We perform property inspections, provide information on codes and ordinances, and issue permits. In fiscal year 2009-2010, most construction permits were for building alterations or additions.

Demolitions include Vishay Sprague in the Industrial park and a vacant apartment building on Bodwell Street. Residential subdivisions in various stages of completion include Hillside Crossing, Ridley Ridge, Hersom Farm, Cedar Woods, Springvale Station, Calvin's Way, and Bernice Avenue. Five permits were issued for renovating residential properties under the National Stabilization Act.

Besides inspecting new construction and renovations, the Codes Enforcement Office performs inspections for license renewal, and responds to complaints associated with buildings and land use. Compliance with codes, ordinances, and state statutes is sought.

The Zoning Board of Appeals may hear appeals of decisions based on the Zoning Ordinance and made by the Codes Enforcement Officer. During 2009-2010, the ZBA heard 2 administrative appeals, 2 dimensional variance appeals, 2 Shoreland zoning variance appeals, and 1 use variance appeal. One appeal was granted.

The department staff consists of a full-time Administrative Assistant, a full-time Codes Enforcement Officer, and a full-time Chief Codes Enforcement Officer.

Sanford Regional Airport and the Town of Sanford have benefited by nearly \$8 million in runway, taxiway, ramp and other infrastructure improvements in the past 18 months, funded primarily by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the Economic Development Administration (EDA).

Between May and November 2010 our longest runway 7-25 was closed, completely renovated and shifted to the southwest to bring it into compliance with FAA safety standards. The newly reopened runway is longer and stronger, and is capable of accommodating the largest corporate aircraft. Other safety enhancements include new runway signage, lighting, grooving the runway, and installing a new airport beacon on airport property. This \$5.2 million project was funded almost entirely by the FAA, with the State of Maine and Town of Sanford each contributing 2 ½ percent to the project.

Also in 2010, a new \$1.4 million aircraft taxiway and 63,500 square foot apron were completed in the vicinity of the former Navy hangar. This project follows a new \$2.2 million parallel taxiway addition in 2009, opens the airport's west side for commercial development, and creates a "shovel ready" building site for a large aviation enterprise. The federal Economic Development Administration and the Town of Sanford shared the cost of this project.

Sanford Regional Airport, the airport's Fixed Based Operator Southern Maine Aviation, and our locally owned Cockpit Cafe restaurant continued to host many public and charitable events in 2010 despite ongoing construction. The Open House/Elks' Car Show/Plane Pull was a great success, as were the Waban Dirt Drags, Maine Model Jet Rally, Young Eagles Rallies, two visits from the New England Aerobatic Club, Friday night acoustic jam sessions at the Cafe, and the Red Star Pilots' Pumpkin Drop into Number 1 Pond.

Sanford residents can take pride that their hometown airport is already among the top three busiest airports in the State, has the second largest number of based aircraft, and offers the fourth longest runway in Maine.

Moe Payeur, Jim Emmons, and Assistant Airport Manager Sherry Lord take great care to ensure that Sanford Regional Airport maintains its reputation in the local and aviation community as one of the finest, friendliest, most capable and best maintained airports in the Northeast. It is a tremendous asset to the community.

## **Recreation and Public Property**

Facilities Projects completed this year included a new heating system at Central Fire Station and an upgrade of the electrical system in the Town Hall Auditorium. The Cooling Tower was replaced in the Town Hall Annex and a slate look alike Town Hall roof installed.

On the recreation side of our department we had a busy summer. Our summer camps hosted over 400 children, providing them with a safe summer season filled with a wide variety of activities. Blouin Fields provided plenty of room for golf for the 5<sup>th</sup> – 7<sup>th</sup> grade day camps, along with soccer, baseball and field hockey camps. Sue DeBoth, Casey Maggio and Missy Rizzo headed up our Day Camps. We moved Jr. Day camp to Margaret Chase Smith School and morning Camps were held at Carpentier, Benton and Springvale playgrounds. The children had outings to Ferry Beach in Saco, Fun Town-Splash Town, as well as local fun spots, including Bowl-O-Rama and Fire Me Up. A weekly trip to Holdsworth Park was also part of the summer activities. The kids were treated to ski shows, puppet shows, canine training displays, just to name some of the extra curricular activities enjoyed.

Our Park facilities hosted 17 weddings during the Spring/Summer months. We had numerous birthday parties and family reunions, not to mention workplace outings, cub scouts and National Guard picnics, baby showers and “medieval” displays. Several upgrades were accomplished in our park areas this year. Roof line back-stop was installed at Goodall Park and the stadium walls were re-pointed. Cracked blocks in both dugouts were repaired. At Holdsworth Park metal roofing was installed on the two picnic shelters and the bathroom facility. Two new 48” culverts were installed under the old entrance way to improve drainage. And at Blouin Field, old infield mix was removed, new infield mix was brought in and the field was laser-graded to proper grade.



**Information Systems  
July 2009 – June 2010**

This year the Information Systems Department made significant improvements to the infrastructure of the town network and servers. A new Windows 2003 server was implemented at the Town Hall to migrate the town Windows network to the 2003 level. The Vision Appraisal Assessing software was moved to this new server. A Windows 2003 server was implemented at Central Fire to replace their aging Windows 2000 server. Fire Department file shares, the Firehouse Fire Records Software, and Sweet Ambulance Billing Software were all migrated to this new server. The Police Department File Server was replaced with a new server with more storage capacity. A new Exchange 2007 Server was implemented to replace the aging Exchange 2000 Server. The old server had a fixed limit of 16 GB of data and required users to constantly manage the size of their mailboxes. The new server has approximately 1.25 TB (or 1250 GB) of usable space, which now allows users to store all of their e-mail on the Exchange server without worrying about filling up the e-mail database. It also forces the archival of all e-mail to satisfy any future data discovery requests with much less effort than previously possible.

The police car mobile data terminals were switched from AT&T to Verizon Wireless for cellular service. At the same time, the police cars were equipped with GPS units so that their location can be tracked with the Track Star Automated Vehicle Location System. This system allows the location of police vehicles to be tracked live on a map. This improves officer safety and also provides a means to log the movement of police vehicles for incident replay.

A terminal server application called Propalms was implemented to improve the speed of access to the IMC Police and Fire Records system for Fire Department staff located at the remote fire stations. Their access prior to using this system was slow due to the relatively slow network connection speed at the remote locations. The Propalms system was installed on two retired servers to keep the cost to a minimum. The IMC programs run on the Propalms servers which have a fast connection to the IMC server. Propalms only sends screen updates to the end-user which uses much less network bandwidth than the native IMC application does.

A significant amount of time was spent preparing the infrastructure for the new Police Station. In preparation for the new station, the old unsupported Riverstone routers at the Town Hall were replaced this year with new Hewlett-Packard switches with more capacity and a lifetime warranty. Similar switches were implemented in the new Police Station so that the Town Hall and Police Station networks are fully integrated and connected via multiple fiber-optic links. The network and dispatch center were pre-wired so that on "moving day" down-time was kept as short as possible. The Police Department File Server, IMC Records Management Server, IMC Mobile Controller Computer, State Police Network, and all Dispatch computers were moved to the new facility overnight and successfully brought back on-line within hours.

## Public Works / Engineering Department July 2009-June 2010

During the past year the Public Works Department has strived to provide maximum service to the community through the Bureaus of Highways, Sanitation, Mechanics and Engineering. I am proud of the employees within all bureaus of the Public Works Department for their dedication, commitment and service to the citizens of Sanford/Springvale. They are at their best when nature's conditions are at the worst, and their efforts are vital to the public welfare.

Sanford's fiscal challenges result in continuing competition for available funds and reductions in work force, but not in the expectations for delivery of services. Demand for services coupled with rising costs, reinforce the Department's focus on "doing more with less". Our challenge is to embrace change to better use the resources that we have. The Department responds to all of the demands for routinely maintaining and reconstructing the Town's streets and highways, including winter and summer maintenance; storm water management system; solid waste handling and disposal, including rubbish and recycling; operation of the Transfer Station which accepts rubbish, recyclables, construction and demolition debris, brush, lawn and yard waste, bulky waste items, tires, metals, appliances, electronic and universal waste, including fluorescent bulbs, cathode ray tubes, and electronic waste. In addition we respond to all that nature throws our way.

Our staff also designs, reviews and/or inspects the many public works construction projects performed each year. The Engineering staff reviews all development proposals submitted to the Planning Board for approval, and monitors their construction after they are approved. Designing projects in house results in a significant cost savings, when compared to the cost of retaining consultants to perform this work. These projects vary in scale from major projects like the Verona Street drainage project, and road reconstruction projects accomplished by the Public Works Department, to smaller scale drainage issues and studies. The continuation of the pavement management program and repairing and replacing sidewalks will require continued commitment by the Town.

The completion of the Berwick Road and Ridley Road reconstructions, the Twombly Road culvert stabilization project, the design and bidding for the replacement of the damaged culvert on Whichers Mill Road, and numerous smaller sidewalk and drainage projects constituted the lion's share of the major construction projects from these programs. In the meantime the maintenance of all of the Department's rolling stock and equipment, along with Fire, Parks and Airport vehicles is an ongoing task. Public Works alone has fleet and equipment with replacement costs that exceeds \$6,000,000.

In the solid waste arena, our staff worked diligently to plan for the implementation of the Pay as You Throw disposal program. This program dramatically lowered the amount of solid waste sent to MERC for disposal, and greatly increased the amount of recyclables sent to Ecomaine. Tip fees at MERC at year end were \$68.20 per ton, while the disposal of recycling has no tip fee. Efforts to inform the public about the program, coordinate with retail outlets in the community, and arrange for manufacture, warehousing, ordering and distribution of bags, invoicing, collection and accounting of funds were among the many challenges that were successfully accomplished.

## Public Works / Engineering Department July 2009-June 2010

The program commenced the week of July 12, 2010. A Town wide referendum vote on November 2nd 2010 overturned PAYT.

Among our other activities were completing the specifications and bidding of the Salt Storage Building at the Public Works Facility, working with the Maine Department of Transportation's stakeholders group to influence state plans to re-define road maintenance responsibilities, and working with the MDOT and the University of Southern Maine to evaluate winter road maintenance programs in Maine (with a focus on the use of road salt).

On behalf of the Department I would like to thank the community for its support of our activities. Our goal is to provide quality service with the resources that you provide us. We look forward to another challenging and successful year.

This past year was an historic time for the Sanford Police Department. On June 14, 2010, we took occupancy of the new Police Department building, leaving behind the old, dark, crowded, and non-functional space in the Town Hall Annex. Many Sanford townspeople took advantage of three opportunities to tour the new building, and were guided by Sanford Police Officers and Sanford Police Cadets. Once again, I would like to say a heart felt "thank you" to all of the citizens of Sanford for allowing this beautiful police station to be built.

Two of your officers, School Resource Officers Michael Thornton and Michael Gordon were honored by the Maine Association of Police and the Maine Chiefs of Police Association for their work with the ever expanding Cadet Program. "Mike and Mike" have provided a program that channels the energy of young people toward public service, and away from activities that often lead to criminal acts and drug abuse. Their program is so successful that there is a waiting list of students who wish to complete the "Cadet Academy." Cadets are often seen at events around Town, and have assisted with National Night Out and dozens of community-based activities.

Our commitment to Community Policing is steadily increasing. Along with the two grant-funded officers, one of my goals is to develop a Community Policing Training Program in York County that would offer a basic Community Policing course for patrol officers and supervisors. The course would be hosted initially in our new training facility. I hope to acquire the support of the other area police departments, so that eventually, every police department in York County would participate and have the ability to expose their officers to the advantages of solving problems in the community rather than just responding to calls-for-service.

Thanks to grant funds provided by the Department of Justice, Sanford Police Officers participated in an eight hour training day that focused on emergency vehicle operations (EVO) and use of deadly force. Sergeant Tim Strout put officers through an approved EVO course at the airport, while Sergeant Craig Andersen and our firearms range staff reinforced firearms safety and tactics, and reviewed and discussed the latest court decisions and best practices regarding use of deadly force.

As always, I thank the citizens of Sanford for providing me with the opportunity to lead the professional men and women who comprise this fine police department. I encourage you to write or email to me any suggestions that you might have for making your police department even better.

### Annual report for 2009/10

The operating budget for the year was \$3,588,601.00 with no capital expenses.

The Fire Department answered 3779 calls this year; this is up 5.3% from the previous year. Sadly two of these calls were fire related fatalities.

Approximately 66% of total calls were medically related. In Sanford and Springvale if you call for an ambulance, the fire department will send the closest unit to your address. Often times this creates confusion to the customer because a fire engine sometimes arrives first. These engines are operated by medically qualified firefighters and are trained to provide you with life saving treatment. They are equipped with the same basic equipment that the ambulance carries, and often times make a significant difference in your medical outcome.

The Department operates out of 3 stations; Central, South Sanford, and Springvale. Springvale and South Sanford each have an engine staffed by 2 firefighters. Central Station houses an engine, ladder, and a rescue (ambulance), and staffing is 4 firefighters and 2 paramedics. There are additional vehicles in each station, but they are not staffed. The Call Company consists of approx 25 members who respond on major incidents.

There are times you may come to a station for information, a burning permit, a tour, etc, and not find anyone there. With the increase in all types of calls, both emergency and service type, we are often on the road taking care of other business. We apologize for any inconvenience.

Fire Chief Raymond M. Parent has decided to retire after serving the Town for over 14 years. We thank him for his many years of service and on many fronts; Fire Chief, EMA Director, Interim Town Manager, and Chairman of the Veterans Cemetery Committee.

I would like to thank all the members of the department for their hard work and dedication in serving the people of Sanford/Springvale. To our neighbors who assist us in delivering service when the tasks get overwhelming, thank you. And thank you to the residents and visitor of Sanford/Springvale for providing us with the means to protect you and your families.

### **General Assistance History**

The “General Assistance Program”, as it is known today, has progressed a long way from the Elizabethan Poor Laws of England that were re-established in the early colonial days of America and became a part of Maine law when Maine became a State in 1820.

The laws provided that the "Overseers of a municipality or some person or persons designated by them to act on their behalf shall have the care of all persons within a municipality and shall cause them to be relieved ...” The law clearly stated that the municipality had the responsibility for all eligible people who were in need. The duties of the “Board of Overseers” included determining who was eligible, residency of the family, amount of assistance to be rendered, and how the assistance was to be provided. The “Board of Overseers” also had the responsibility for administering the “almshouse” or “poor farm” if such was available in the community.

In the early 1920s, after passage of the “Mothers’ Aid” and “Child Guardian” bills, a separate local board was established for the administration of care for children. In the 1930s, the responsibility for several other groups in the population was shifted to the Federal Government. The Local Board of the “Overseers of the Poor” was no longer responsible for the blind, aged, veterans and their families, and in some instances, able-bodied unemployed men. Other programs such as Social Security, Workers’ Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, Veterans’ Administration, and some of the Depression work-related programs were developed because General Assistance was unable to manage the tremendous needs that were facing the communities.

The “Overseers of the Poor” continued to be responsible for transients, some intact families, and for individuals who did not meet eligibility criteria of other State and Federal programs. In addition, “General Assistance” supplemented, as it still does today, some of the benefits received from State and Federal programs when the income was not sufficient to meet basic household needs. By this time, assistance was provided to individuals and their families in their own homes as opposed to “poor farms”.

While the scope of the General Assistance Program has changed significantly over the years, the “Need” for shelter, heating fuel, food, and other basic living expenses are still there for many people. In order to relieve the overall conditions and circumstances that many of the applicants find themselves in, this office attempts to look at the individual(s) and

families holistically for their welfare and also society at large. Much time is now spent in advocating for clients as well as non-clients in order to assess and access the services necessary to ensure that they are maintained in an adequate state of health and decency. This is done regardless of any General Assistance provided by this office. Many hours are spent responding to the need for food, shelter, heating fuel, utilities, and other basic living expenses.

**TREASURER'S OFFICE**

The Treasurer's Office primary functions include the collection of Town/School revenue, real estate tax liens, the management of cash flow and investments, the reconciliation of bank accounts and trust accounts, the administration of state/federal grants and tax increment financing.

On August 17, 2009, the Town Clerk/Tax Collector committed, to the Treasurer, 421 liens in the amount of \$887,160 for collection. The liens were a result of nonpayment of 2008/2009 real estate taxes. On February 11, 2010, the 2007/2008 real estate liens matured and the Town acquired 7 parcels of property (land only) and 1 owner occupied mobile home. This was the highest number of foreclosures since 1995.

The State of Maine currently has a property tax relief program known as the "circuit breaker" program that has been in effect for over 20 years. The maximum benefit for 2010/2011 is \$1,600. The income limits are based on 2009 - \$61,400 for single and \$81,850 with spouse or dependents. The State no longer mails applications to Town Hall. However, the State continues to mail to those who have previously applied to the program. Filing on-line is now preferred. The website is: [www.maine.gov/revenue](http://www.maine.gov/revenue). If a person qualifies for a refund, a check is mailed directly to the applicant or funds are deposited into a bank account. For help or questions with the application process, please contact Town Hall.

For those unaware of the lien process, the State of Maine has a tough law when it comes to paying real estate taxes. Within a year from when the taxes are due, the Tax Collector sends a 30-Day Lien Notice to property owners and mortgage holders indicating that, if the taxes are not paid in full, a lien will be placed on the property. After the deadline, liens are recorded at the Registry of Deeds. The Tax Collector then commits them to the Treasurer for collection for continued collection over an 18 month period. From 30-45 days before the maturity date, the Treasurer sends, by certified mail, "Notices of Impending Foreclosure" to those property owners and mortgage holders on record. If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the lien matures and an automatic foreclosure occurs.

After foreclosure, the Treasurer turns the properties over to the Town Council for disposition. There is no obligation on their part to return the property to the former owner. Although foreclosures of owner occupied homes have been rare, it is nice to know that, historically, our Council has always believed in returning homes to former owners. An agreement is usually made to have the owner repay the Town in either a lump sum or over a period of time and a Quitclaim Deed is subsequently issued to return the property back to the former owner. In closing, the status of the Town's debt service and the outstanding real estate tax liens are included with this report.

## **SANFORD SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT**

Thank you for the opportunity to report and reflect upon the past school year.

Throughout the past year we have taken advantage of the huge financial support that the Sanford School District was able to access through participation in grant initiatives. The Safe Schools Healthy Student initiative brings to our community opportunities for underserved students to create a voice in their school and neighborhood. The creation of FAME (Friends and Mentors Entertainment) allowed students to demonstrate their visual and performing arts talents through the creation of Public Service Announcements viewable on the School Department Website and the documentary film April's Heart. Reconnecting Youth and Leadership and Resiliency classes at SHS provide support for students at risk of dropping out of school. Substance Abuse Intervention / Prevention activities formerly provided with Title IV funds take place after school and in the community. Outreach Teams provide Family Systems work in the homes of students participating in the school based Student Assistance Teams. Sanford Police Academy provides after school, summer and vacation experiences for students in character development fitness and citizenship. The Sanford Springvale Animal Welfare Club brings out the talents of those students devoted to the care and wellbeing of animals. The Sanford Well Child Council does outreach to parents of preschoolers, helping improve school readiness.

Sanford received ARRA funding to help with the offset of loss of state revenues. The School Committee chose to use this time limited funding to provide Social Emotional Resources to our students.

The winter of 2009 brought the opportunity to develop and collaborate with the community around the management of the H1N1 clinics. Sanford received commendation from the Maine CDC on the operation of these clinics.

The Sanford School Committee, through their work in developing the Great Works project, embraced the concept of Visioning and Strategic Planning. Through the tireless work of our community visioning partners and including students, parents, staff members and administrators the School Committee accepted a Vision of Education in Sanford for 2015, and is committed to actualizing that Vision by enacting the strategies and priorities found in the 5 year Strategic Plan. This action creates a unified vision for education K-Adult. All the budget priorities articulate with the plan. The plan also includes a technology plan and an updated Safety Plan for all schools.

The Committee as noted in our previous report re-submitted an improved Great Works Innovative School Construction Project, only to learn in December, that they were out scored. Even on appeal, it was not successful. Undaunted, the School Committee with consultation from Portland Design Team completed and submitted 4 applications for conventional school construction. Applications were submitted to substantially renovate or rebuild Emerson School, Lafayette School, Willard School and the SHS Sanford Regional Technology Center. Those applications will be reviewed by the Maine Department of Education, and rank ordered in the Spring of 2011. Any new construction initiative is subject to funding as determined by the legislature.

Commendations are due to Sanford Community Adult Education in once again obtaining a Barbara Bush Literacy grant in the amount of \$25,000.00. Nancy Kane SHS English Teacher was a semifinalist in the Maine Teacher of the Year Program. Single gender classes under the instruction of Ms. Barbara Noon and Ms. Tracy Wagenfeld continue to flourish. Sanford Regional Technology Center welcomes Jim Stopa as its new director, and a warm welcome to Michael Kucsma as the district's business manager.

This has been a very exciting and invigorating school year. The School Committee is commended for adopting the Vision for Education in 2015. I continue be thankful for the support of the Administrative Team, teaching staff, school committee and our community members.

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2,151 adults in the greater Sanford area took more than 250 classes through Sanford Community Adult Education in the 09-10 fiscal year.

This was our second year at the Anderson Learning Center and we are really enjoying it. We love the space, although with our increases in student enrollment we are feeling very crowded. We are still hosting the University Classes and had over 100 students take ITV classes this year at our facility.

The enrichment program picked up a bit this year compared to last year. Zumba has been a big hit as well as Belly Dancing. We continued to work with SRVC to offer vocational programs to adults. These included Welding, Machine Trades, and CNA.

The academic programs are continuing to grow. 15 people completed Certified Nursing Assistant training through adult education this year, 15 people earned 34 certificates through the Employment Skills Certification Program and 58 students graduated with high school credentials. The economy has made SCAE an economical place for job retraining and we have been helping many residents to improve job opportunities.

SCAE again, received a \$30,000 grant from the state government to run a College Transitions Program. Our program is called "The ROAD to College Certificate Program" ROAD stands for Removing Obstacles, Achieving Dreams. 60 students participated in this program, 8 completed their certificates by June.

SCAE's Family Literacy Program Families READ continued to thrive during the 09-10 year. This was our second year as a "Lighthouse Program," we were given \$25,000 to use for the program and for promoting Family Literacy throughout the area. SCAE and the Family Literacy Coordinator planned a state-wide early literacy conference held in Augusta in March of 2010. We had Bruce Jacques in as a comedian for our annual Family Literacy fundraiser.

The SCAE Advisory Board continued to meet and work on strategic plan goals. We are always looking for new members on the board. Please call SCAE if interested.

## **Report from the Special Education Co-Directors**

Thank you for the opportunity to review the operation of the Office of Special Education for the Sanford School Department and related Federal Projects. The division of Special Education is responsible for the identification, programming and transitioning of students with special education needs according to the provisions of State and Federal law.

We are grateful to the Sanford School Committee and Finance Committee for their support of the Special Education budget. In 2006 this legislation was intended to cover the excess cost of education for students with disabilities in our public schools. The legislation has never been 100% funded, and given the hold in funding, will increase the demands on the public schools to cover the costs.

During the 2009-2010 school year, 658 students were served through the special education programming through the Sanford School Department. Included in this number are 43 students who entered kindergarten already identified for Special Education. The number of students who required out of unit placement for needs so significant that they could not be met within the public school was 12 out of district placements, with 3 of them being State Agency Clients.

The division also has oversight for Title 1 ESEA. This federally funded program, which began in 1965, is for supplemental education support. In Sanford, supplemental math instruction is provided after school for eligible students in grades 2-6. Literacy support for students in grades 1-6 occurs for 90-minutes per week during the school day, except at Willard where 6<sup>th</sup> graders are seen after school. Previously, using Title I ARRA funds

Our Title I ESEA programs provided literacy and math instruction to an unduplicated count of 344 students. Summer School participation included 45 students (K-2). Title I also provided parent training in helping parents support students in reading. Title I continues to support K-6 schools for parent/family involvement in Math and Literacy. Title I continues to support students at St. Thomas school in literacy with programming similar to that provided to public school students.

Title I services are required to be provided to students who experience homelessness within our schools. It is significant to note that there was a 45% increase in students who were homeless during the 2009-2010 school year. Fifty-three students were identified as homeless, and received a variety of support from Title I.

## MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT

As a Department, custodians and maintenance personnel provide clean and safe educational spaces for nearly 4,000 students and staff.

The Custodial/Maintenance Department maintains nine (9) educational buildings totaling over 484,000 square feet. This department is also responsible for the maintenance of eighty-five (85) acres of lawn, playground, sports facilities and storage buildings. The maintenance of these facilities is accomplished with twenty-nine (29) full time custodians, one (1) director, two (2) maintenance/groundskeeper and one (1) full time secretary.

In addition to regular maintenance, the following projects were accomplished: Lafayette School – renovation of a classroom into a computer lab and office space; removal of asbestos floor tiles in three (3) classrooms and new VCT flooring installed. Emerson School – Added hot water to all classroom and restroom sinks; electrical panel upgrade. Carl J. Lamb School – Removed all carpet in the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor hallway and replaced with VCT flooring; installation of new roof; added additional staff parking; re-pointed as needed and waterproofed the exterior. Margaret Chase Smith School – Moved the playground equipment from the old Lincoln School to the playground at MCS; repainted cafeteria and replaced some carpet with VCT flooring.

Sanford High School/Sanford Technical School – As part of a three (3) year plan we replaced six (6) sets of fire doors, installed eighty (80) intruder lever locks as part of phase 1, room V-11 asbestos floor tile removed and replaced with VCT as well as other areas throughout the building. Junior High School – Installed six (6) sets of fire barrier doors. Willard/Memorial Gym – Ten (10) egress windows installed in basement classrooms; HVAC ductwork added in cafeteria. First Steps Childcare – Installed new fence; paved horseshoe driveway and parking lot.

## **Carl J. Lamb Elementary School**

The Carl J Lamb School had an enrollment of 547 students in grades K-6 during the 2009-2010 school year. The educational staff consists of 26 classroom teachers plus several support staff. Services are: Art, Music, Physical Education, Health, Library Instruction, Computer Instruction, Title 1 Reading, Reading Recovery, Speech, Special Education Services, School-based Counseling, Occupational and Physical Therapy.

Carl J Lamb provides a rigorous academic program to our K-6 students. Policies and procedures are consistent and allow staff to spend adequate time teaching academics. The Every Day Math Program, the Daily 5 Reading Management System, grade level science kits, social studies resources, writing portfolios, and the sixth grade Springboard Literacy program have strengthened the K-6 curriculum. Grade level curriculum brochures have been updated and distributed to teachers and parents.

The 21<sup>st</sup> Century Grant funded the Kids Club after school program for students in grades 2-6 for a sixth year at Carl Lamb School. Homework and skill practice is scheduled for the first half of each after school session and enrichment activities are offered during the second half of each session. Title 1 Math provides extra support after school too. Community connections and family events are an integral part of after school programs.

CJL Staff holds regular family events at CJL to encourage parents and children to learn and have fun together. Math Night, Fitness Night, Movie Night and Literacy night were all a huge success during the 2009-2010 school year. PTG fundraising events support cultural activities for CJL: Portland Symphony Orchestra Kinder concerts for K-3, trips to the PSO and the Art Museum for fourth graders, CHEWONKI science school for all K-6 students, and new red and blue Kindergarten playground equipment.

The Student Assistance Team, made up of Safe Schools Healthy Students Grant Staff and School Personnel, provides resources to classroom teachers to assist with academic and social needs of some students. Second Step, a social emotional classroom based program has been implemented in K-6 classes and supported by school counselors. The positive climate of the school reflects this work.

The Carl Lamb School staff has worked diligently this year to provide a balanced education to the children in our care. We wish to thank the Sanford/Springvale community for their on going support of our school.

## Emerson School

Approximately 134 students attended grades one, two, and three at the Emerson School. We have two 1st grade, two 2nd grade, two 3rd grade, and two multi-level special education classrooms. The students at Emerson receive other academic services of art, music, physical education, health, computer, and library skills.

We believe in providing a strong foundation in literacy and math. Teachers began to use the Daily Five to help manage literacy instruction, and CAFÉ to help students understand and master different strategies used by successful readers. For math instruction, the teachers continue to use Everyday Math. Teachers used their collaboration time to discuss ways to improve instruction in all areas.

We are mindful of the requirements of the Maine Learning Results as our primary educational objectives. This year we added the grade level expectations for the New England Common Assessment Program (NECAP) to help guide our instruction. Emerson is making Adequate Yearly Progress in both reading and math.

In grades two and three we have continued to administer the NWEA test which enables us to identify each student's specific areas of strength and weakness in reading, math, and language usage. This year one of our first grades piloted the NWEA for primary grades. Strong areas are supplemented for further growth while weaker areas are addressed to improve skills.

All regular education classrooms now have a Promethean Board, an interactive whiteboard. Staff received professional development for use in classroom instruction. Each board is used continually throughout the day. Emerson received a small grant to have access to electronic literature which was used by the teachers in the classroom on the Prometheans.

The library also received a small grant to help spruce up the room. A group of librarians from the state worked with our librarian to brainstorm what needed to be done. With the help of the custodians, the room was painted, a new rug installed, and the furniture rearranged.

Our Parent Teacher Group held many activity nights for families. The PTG sponsored the entire school's trip to the Maine Wildlife Park in Gray in June and paid for the tee-shirts students tie-dyed to wear there. The staff at Emerson is very appreciative for the groups help.

## Margaret Chase Smith School

Margaret Chase Smith School had a population of about 365 students in grades Kindergarten through three for this school year. The educational staff consists of: six kindergarten teachers, a developmental kindergarten teacher, four first grade, four second grade and four third grade teachers; a special education program for grades one and two; and a support staff of eighteen. Other academic services include: Art, Music, Physical Education, Health, Science, Title 1 Reading, Speech, Special Ed. Services, Occupational and Physical Therapy and Reading Recovery.

The Title 1 math program completed its fifth year and served students in grades two and three, as well as some first graders. These students were identified through test scores to receive extra services after school two days per week. Children start with a snack and a math game, and then work with one of three teachers to practice their math skills. Every other week they used the computers as part of their practice time. The first graders receive their services during the school day.

Educational instruction here at MCS includes the use of the Everyday math program and Maine Literacy Partnership framework for reading and writing. Students not only participate in reading and writing activities but also reading buddies time, literature circle, and reading challenge activities. Third graders continue to receive instruction from a science teacher who travels throughout the district. Students participate in district assessments through computer as well as paper and pencil activities. Third graders took the NECAP test this year, as the state now requires this test for grades three to eleven.

Our PTG continues to be a very active part of MCS. They hosted their sixth annual Halloween party and did it in two different sessions because of the numbers of families that attend this event. The PTG also sponsored "Shop Til' You Drop" in December, helped to support "Reading Under the Stars", and organized a family night at a Sea Dogs game in May. The families got to run around the field before the game and the children sang the "National Anthem" on the field before the game started. The students also got to sing the "National Anthem" at a Mainers' game.

The MCS staff supports a wide variety of activities for students including: our annual Veterans' Day ceremony attended by many Veterans and family members who are in the service; the Terrific Kids Program (sponsored by the Kiwanis), bus and fire safety; individual class trips (to the Planetarium, fire station, Gray Animal Farm, and the Margaret Chase Smith Museum), as well as other events that support academics. This year two of our third grade students got to be "Kids' Reporters" for Channel 13 and appeared on the Early Morning News. Another student was the "Kid Weather Reporter" on Channel 8 News. The children also donated over a 100 items to the Food Pantry for the 100<sup>th</sup> Day of School; and more than 100 pair of pajamas to Care Link and other facilities. The Reading Challenge for the year focused on "Reading is a Thrill", and a roller coaster and water slide adorned the hallway. Our PTG also added to the "thrill" of the challenge by awarding many special prizes – including a ride on the Amtrak Train to Boston – at the end of the program and helping with a special "Wet Day" during the last week of school. One of the students stated: "This is the best reading reward we ever had – it's the best day of my life!!"

## WILLARD SCHOOL

We accomplished three building goals in 2009-2010. Our first goal was to maximize student learning strategies for students who do not meet attendance, behavioural, and academic expectations.

- Administrators and guidance staff monitored students' attendance and discipline data and academic grades
- Students experiencing difficulties in these areas went through Willard School's Student Assistance Team (S.A.T.) process
- Teachers met with a member of the S.A.T. to discuss interventions
- Teachers and administrators collaborated with behaviour coaches to create and implement behaviour plans for students who struggle with attendance and/or behaviours
- Met with parents after their child had ten or more absences to develop a plan for improvement
- Recognized students each trimester who had great attendance, grades, and good behaviours

Our second goal was to continue professional development in the area of literacy.

- Staff had regular consultation meetings with literacy coaches to discuss struggling students in the area of literacy
- Grades four and five received professional development in the use of Daily 5 literacy management system
- Grade six teachers had on-going professional development in the instruction of Springboard

Our third goal was to support students' physical, emotional and social growth.

- Recognized students who demonstrated our district's core values through a school wide program called "Good to the Core"
- Building administrators led staff discussions to determine staff needs.
- All 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, and 6<sup>th</sup> grade classrooms fully implemented the Second-Steps curriculum.
- Piloting of Single-gender classes in 6<sup>th</sup> grade

The 21<sup>st</sup> Century Grant continues to fund Kids' Club, an after school program for students in grades 4-6. Assistance with homework is offered during the first half of each session followed by enrichment activities for the remainder of each session.

We are in our fifth year of having a district-wide Gifted and Talented Program for student in grades 3-12. Selected students at Willard School and their classroom teachers have been supported by Mrs. Fern Brown, the G/T coordinator for grades 3-6. Willard School was able to restart a school Math Team after a one year hiatus.

We believe these changes and opportunities will make a difference in our students' lives.

## **Lafayette School**

Approximately 100 students attended grades one, two, and three at the Lafayette School in the 2009-2010 year. Our total amount of classes included two first grade rooms, two second grades, and two third grades.

First and foremost, we are always mindful of the requirements of the Maine Learning Results and those are our primary educational objectives. We realize the importance of providing a strong foundation in literacy and math at these early years and that it is the best gift we can give our students. As a result, we look to connect content area teaching with literacy and math. Children in grades one, two and three are receiving library skills lessons once a week helping them use resources in all content areas. In addition, our children have health classes with a certified health teacher, as well as instruction in music, physical education and art.

It is our belief that the combination of all the areas of study provide for a well rounded education and allow for opportunities, which enhance learning. Over the summer, renovations to the office and computer room were completed creating an updated and accessible computer lab, office, and entrance for visitors. The lab allows entire classes to receive computer instruction and testing in a comfortable setting.

In grades two and three we have continued to administer the NWEA test series which enables us to identify each student's specific areas of strengths and weaknesses in reading and math. Strong areas are supplemented for further growth while weaker areas can be addressed to improve skills in identified areas. Teachers have been administering and scoring assessments in the other content areas, creating an even greater consistency across grade levels that we have had in past years.

This year, early release days for students allowed all district teachers to meet by grade levels and work on consistency of instruction from one building to another. The benefits of the equalized instruction also assist with students who may move within the district during the year. A placement at a different school would allow for the continuation of the same methods of instruction within our curriculum.

One of our most valuable assets is the group of parent volunteers from the families at Lafayette. Their commitment to education and assistance when called upon has been immeasurable. We thank them for their generous help throughout the school year.

## Sanford Junior High School

Sanford Junior High School's most important goal for the 2009-10 school year was the development of a high-quality educational enterprise that would prepare all youngsters for life in a fast-changing and complex world. With this thought in mind, the philosophy and attitude of Sanford Junior High School became rather important. We believe we have the obligation to understand a student's personal needs and to challenge him or her by meeting those needs intellectually, socially, and personally. We believe a high-performing school is one that is academically excellent, developmentally responsive, and socially equitable. By providing a variety of structured experiences in which students can be actively engaged, we believe we can address a student's need to achieve; therefore, we established the following:

- The use of NWEA data to assess the effectiveness of our teams in developing differentiated lessons that meet academically rigorous standards, are consistently challenging, and are developmentally appropriate for each student.
- Classrooms where students are actively involved in their own learning: they question, explore, research, and evaluate their work, focusing on their goals and prepare for their exhibitions at student-led conferences. The students can now articulate what they know, and they can show what they can do.
- We implemented Collins writing program; Springboard to prepare our students for college boards; introduced Smartboards to access high-quality educational materials into the classrooms.
- Staff and Students use "Collaborative Problem Solving" by Dr. Ross Green, author of *The Explosive Child* and the upcoming book "Lost in School".
- We reorganized the traditional department structure and foster the use of teacher teams provided with ample common planning time to integrate the school's curriculum to the extent possible and emphasized depth over breadth of coverage.

The challenges that students met last year at Sanford Junior High School and the support they received had a common purpose: to stimulate their development as individuals and as members of society. SJHS developed young people whose creativity and independence of thought will sustain their continuing inquiry and reflection, whose interest in others and the world around them surpasses their self-concern, and whose passion for learning impels them beyond what they already know.

## Sanford High School

Sanford High School enrolled over 1250 students during 2009-2010. Our High School continues to be highly regarded for creating pathways for students to meet rigorous graduation standards and explore a variety of co-curricular opportunities. School faculty and staff are constantly expanding after school programs as we try to meet the diverse needs of our student body.

Sanford High School performs well in all aspects of school life. We send a high percentage of students on to competitive post secondary colleges, universities and career and technical programs. Sanford High School also increased the number of students in “Early College Program” courses made available through a variety of institutions both on campus and on-line as well. Our partners include The University of Maine, Southern Maine Technical College, York County Community College, The University College System of Maine and the University of Southern Maine.

During the 2009-2010 school year SHS and Sanford Regional Technical Center partnered in the creation of two courses, English For the 21<sup>st</sup> Century and Standards Based Math. Enrolled students were challenged with not only core academic rigor, but a practical “hands-on” component that is geared more closely to a capstone learning experience and group problem solving techniques that are required upon entering the work force or in a career and technical training program. In addition, a “Work Experience” Program is currently being crafted for the 2010-2011 school year. We’re excited about the connections our students will make with mentors from local businesses and the chance to job shadow potential career pathways.

“Reconnecting Youth” continues to expand and promote a youth leadership/mentoring program supported through the SS/HS Grant. This has created a school success learning lab for those that may need a smaller learning environment and one that is project based. Twenty or more students have found themselves working in areas throughout the Sanford/Springvale community cleaning up trails, parks and other team building projects that encourage service learning

The Sanford High School Film Club worked enthusiastically in the creation of April’s Heart. More than sixty students spent the better part of their spring vacation working on this film inspired by classmates’ personal experiences. The film premiered in the fall of 2010.

In addition, both the chorus and band programs enjoyed students selected as Maine All-State and York County Festival Performers. Both programs are seeing growth not only in numbers of performers but in talent as well. A determined Sanford Girls Swim Team won the Southwestern Maine Championship and senior swimmer Jennifer Roberts earned the “Top Maine Swim Award” as chosen by the Maine Swim League.

At graduation ceremonies in June, Sanford High School awarded diplomas to 270 graduating seniors. More than 100,000.00 dollars in scholarship money was donated in support of those furthering their education. It’s been a practice over the past ten years to recognize every student that has applied to the Sanford High School Scholarship Fund.

## **Sanford Regional Technical Center**

On November 1, 2010, the Sanford School Board unanimously approved a name change for the Sanford Regional Vocational Center. Henceforth, our school will be known as the **Sanford Regional Technical Center (SRTC)**. It has been over forty years (1970) since the center first opened its doors. At that time its primary focus was to prepare students for jobs. Today's educational mission for each of our career and technical education programs is to prepare students academically and technically for opportunities in post-secondary education or entry into high skill, high wage, or high demand careers. The administration and staff believe that this small change to the center's name has big implications on how students, parents, educators, and members of the Sanford community see our school. But most importantly, the change in our name reflects what is occurring daily in our classrooms and labs.

The SRTC provides career and technical education for students from Sanford High School and six other high schools in York County. Thirteen programs are located at the Sanford site, three at Noble High School and one at Marshwood High School. The programs offered include: Automotive Technology; Building Trades; Computer Assisted Drafting & Design; Culinary Arts; Digital Design; Early Childhood Education; Engineering Technology; Environmental Science; Graphic Arts; Health Occupations; Information Technology; Media Communications; Precision Manufacturing; Residential Wiring; and Welding & Metal Fabrication.

The SRTC works continuously to raise students' aspirations to continue their education after high school. One component of SRTC's efforts to improve postsecondary education access is a grant from the MELMAC Education Foundation which has been supporting various college preparation activities for the past two years. This year these activities included field trips to college campuses, group and individual assistance to parents and students for the college admissions/financial aid process, and a field trip for staff to Southern Maine Community College to improve collaboration between the schools. Another component is the addition of the Career Planning Center at the SRTC. The goal of the Career Planning Center is to assist our students as they make their transition from high school to the next phase of their lives. Specifically, the center offers students a place to research postsecondary opportunities, improve their math and English skills, and develop job seeking skills.

Each year students from the SRTC participate in SkillsUSA. SkillsUSA is a career & technical student organization that provides students opportunities for leadership development, community service, teamwork, and skill attainment. This organization is specifically tailored to be part of the instructional program and designed to assist students with their transition from school to the career of their choice. Student members participate in the state and national skill competitions and leadership conferences. In March 2010 SRTC sixteen students were awarded medals at the state conference. In June 2010 four students attended the national leadership and skills conference and placed in the top ten in their respective competitive events.

The Sanford Regional Technical Center staff continues to be committed in assisting all students to be successful in their chosen technical pursuits. For more information about the SRTC, please visit our web site at <http://sanford.mainecte.org>.

## Sanford School Department Technology Services

The Sanford School Department received bandwidth upgrades in all schools. The Maine Schools and Libraries Network, now referred to as *Network Maine*, contracted with Fairpoint Communications to double bandwidth in all schools to a minimum of 10 mbps. Sanford High School received additional bandwidth equaling 20+ mbps and a locally managed content filtering device. This upgrade has improved the district's ability to share resources between schools as well as with outside resources.

One ERATE project provided the district with a new server at Emerson School. The server will be part of the email upgrade project planned for 2010-2011. The project was funded by erate at 90% and the district was responsible for 10% of the cost. ERATE is a funding program based on free and reduced lunch totals for each school. Teachers in grades 1, 2 and 3 received Netbooks for their classrooms. The Netbooks were purchased with Title funds by the curriculum office and distributed to the staff in May 2010.

Tandberg distance learning equipment continues to provide access to meetings and classes around the state. At this time, no academic classes are offered via the Tandberg.

As a result of the Maine Laptop Initiative (MLTI3) refresh in the summer of 2009, an additional set of iBooks was prepped for distribution to the sophomore class in the fall of 2010. These iBooks are part of the district purchase of Junior High G4 iBooks at \$175.00 each. These machines will expand the 1:1 program at Sanford High School into grade 10. With this expansion, and the distribution of Netbooks, we saw a net increase of 348 devices for a total of 1708 personal computers in the district.

Title funds were used to purchase 2 Promethean interactive white boards and 2 SMART interactive white boards. The promethean boards are located in Emerson and Lafayette Schools. The SMART boards are located in Willard and Carl J. Lamb School. The district now has 61 interactive white boards in the district.

Technology personnel includes one director, one network administrator, one part time technology coach ( 20 hours/ week) and 6 educational technicians who support curriculum, hardware, repairs, instruction and student use of all of these technologies.

## **Sanford School Nutrition**

Sanford School Nutrition Programs provided breakfast and lunch for students in all seven of the district's schools. The After School Snack Program provided after school snacks for students enrolled in Kids Club at Carl J. Lamb, Margaret Chase Smith and Willard Schools. Sanford School Nutrition Programs served 127,000 breakfasts, 350,000 lunches and 13,600 snacks to the district's students and staff.

Sanford Public Schools sponsored the Summer Foodservice Program for Children at seven sites in the community. Sites are set up where at least 50 percent of students in a school are eligible for free and reduced price meals. Breakfast and lunch was served to children at Carl J. Lamb, Emerson, Margaret Chase Smith and Sanford Junior High Schools and at Carpentier Park. Lunch was also served to children at Benton Park and Springvale Playground. More than 14,000 lunches were served at no cost to children in the community.

The automated Point of Sale program, Nutrikids, was expanded for prepayment and online payment services for students at Sanford High, Sanford Junior High and Willard Schools.

The Nutrikids point-of-sale program offers parents the ability to view their child's meal account at any time, print out purchase history, receive low balance e-mail reminders and make online prepayments to their child's lunch account.

By utilizing the prepayment system, students spend less time in line and have more time to eat. This also helps keep costs down because cafeteria staff are able to spend less time handling money and more time serving students. As you can see, everyone benefits!


The Town of Sanford completed the financial audit process. The Town has received an unqualified opinion for fiscal year 2010.




## GENERAL FUND LIABILITIES



### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

- Changes in accounts payable are a result of the timing of payments at year end.
- The largest component of accrued wages is teacher summer salaries (\$3,736,996). Teacher summer salaries represent payroll earned prior to June, 30 2010, but paid in July and August of 2010. This amount is not accrued for budgetary purposes.
- Deferred revenue represents taxes still unpaid 60 days after the end of the year. These amounts are not recognized as revenues in the current year.

## GENERAL FUND BALANCE



### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

- Designated fund balance changes annually based on the status of capital improvements as well as amounts used toward the subsequent year budget. Detail can be seen in the notes to the financial statements (page 29).
- Undesignated fund balance (town and school) has decreased by \$317,531 as a result of operations. Total fund balance increased by \$101,408. Undesignated fund balance is 12.6% of general fund budget at 6/30/10. RKO typically recommends approximately 8-16% of budget or one to two month's expenditures.





### Revenues






